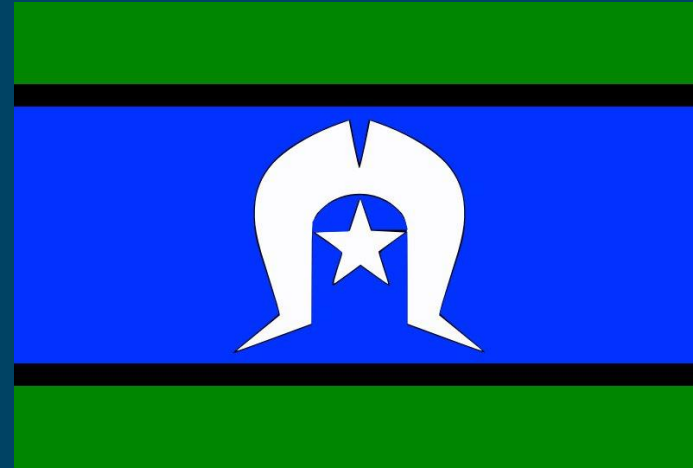

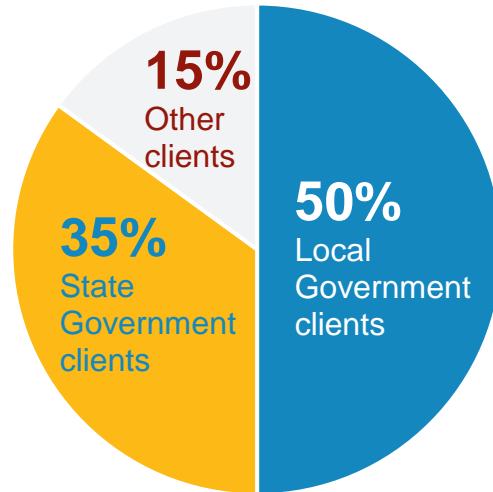

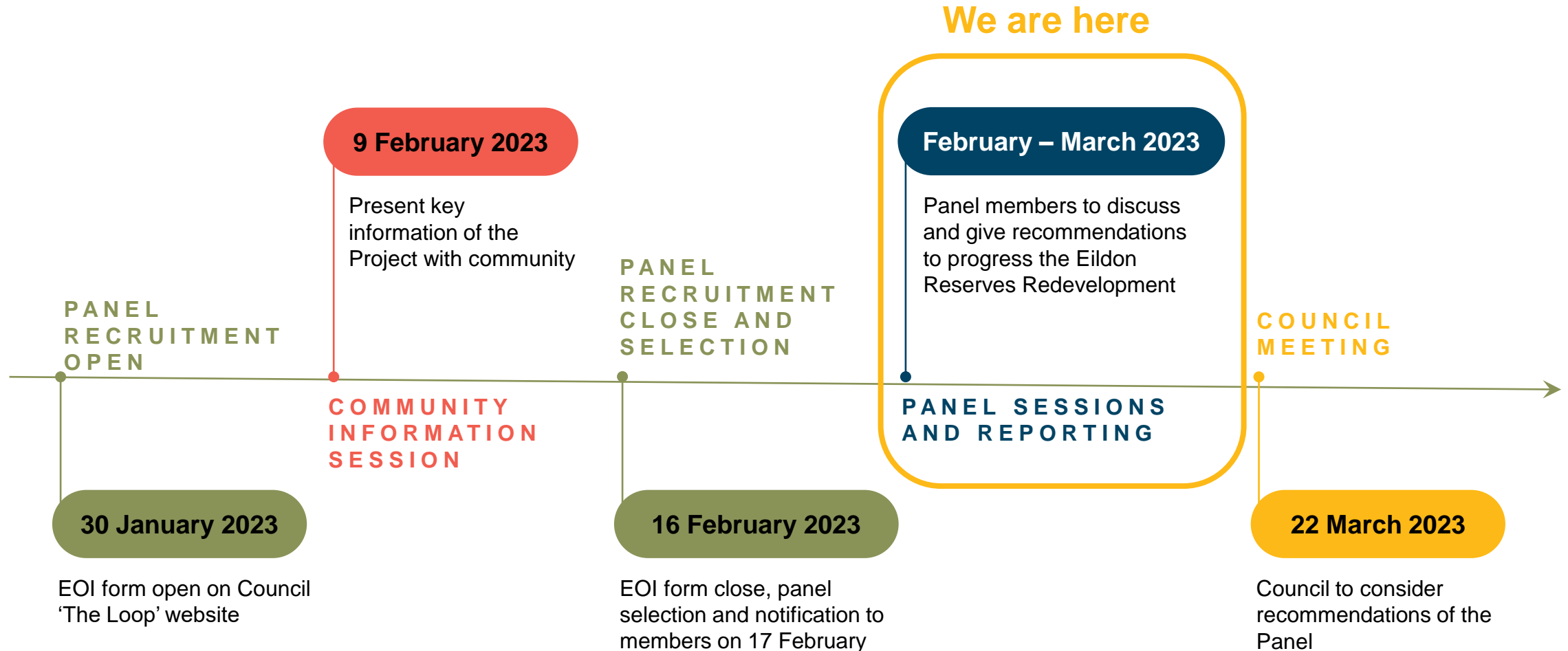

What is a Deliberative Panel?

- **Deliberative engagement** is to:
 - provide community with sufficient time and information
 - enable community to consider options as part of a decision-making process
- **A Deliberative Panel** is:
 - a group process where community representatives come together to learn and discuss issues in detail across sessions
 - Panel members will work through options available to determine the way forward for the project

What will this Panel cover?

To explore:

- the journey so far, from how the project was initially identified as a need, to how designs were developed in consultation with the community
- the connection between the proposed sale of parcels of land and the need to fund elements of the project
- the benefits of selling current underutilised land parcels
- the trade-offs for not selling the land parcels to part fund the project
- the current housing shortage in Eildon and the options for how to utilise the land parcels, if sold
- recommendations from the community to Council on the way forward for the Project.

Options to be deliberated

Option 1:

Proceed with sale of land to support project delivery within the current scope, as per proposed timelines. This will include considerations for new use opportunities for the land parcels if sold

Option 2:

Do not progress with the sale of land, and the project either does not proceed, or it proceeds at a much-reduced scale with fewer benefits to the local economy and user experience

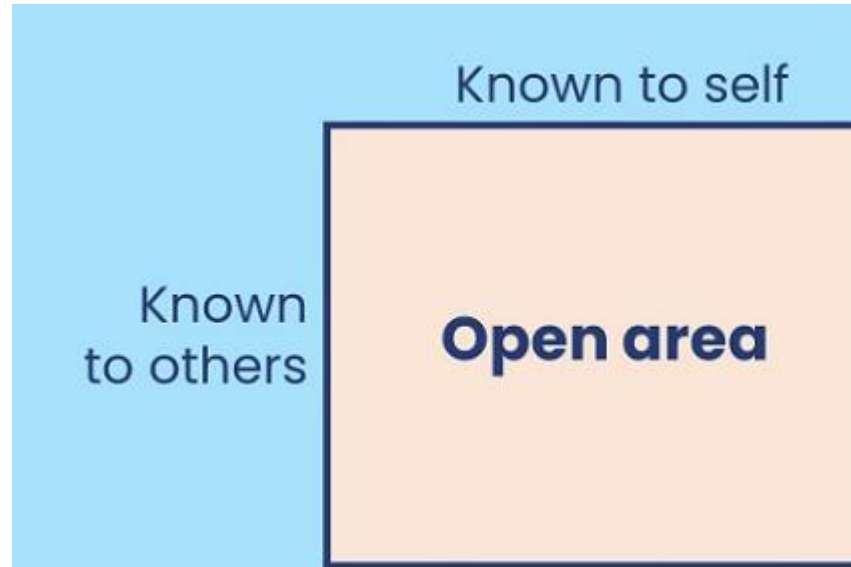
- Support Panel discussions by providing relevant information

Facilitators (Capire)

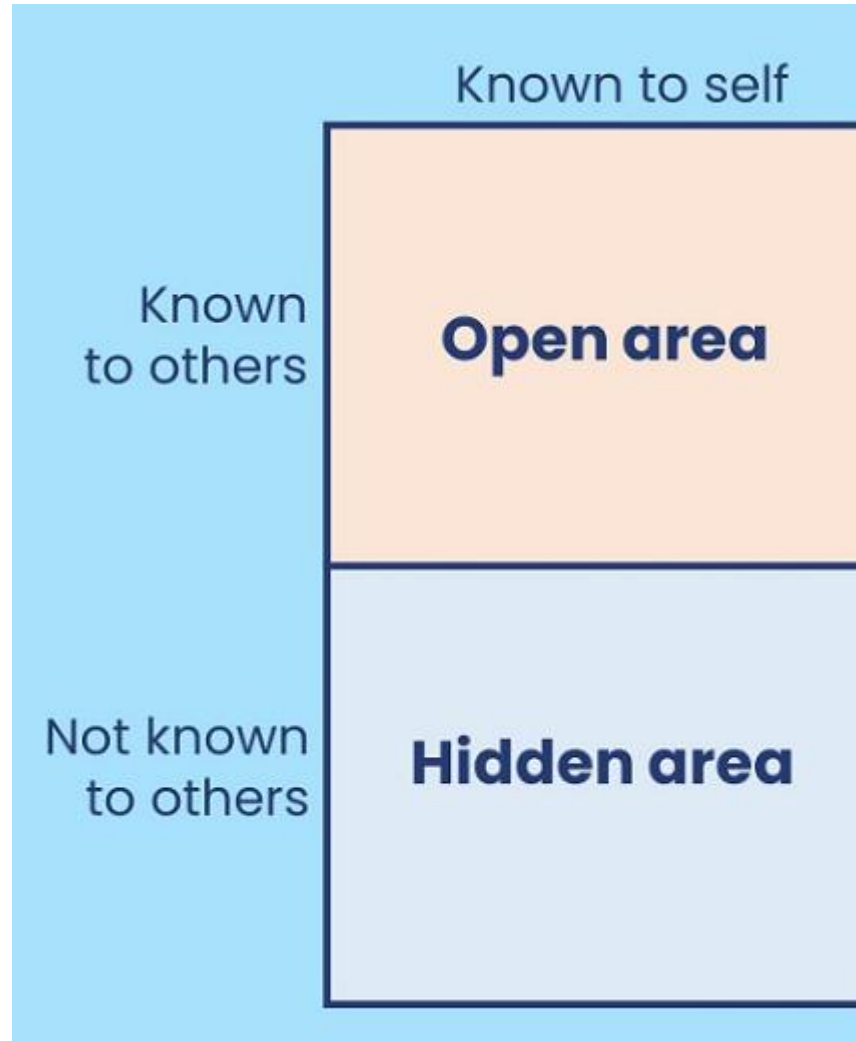
- Lead discussions to support the Panel to make recommendations

Council to adopt the recommendations of the Deliberative Panel if 80 percent of panellists agree with the recommendations being put forward

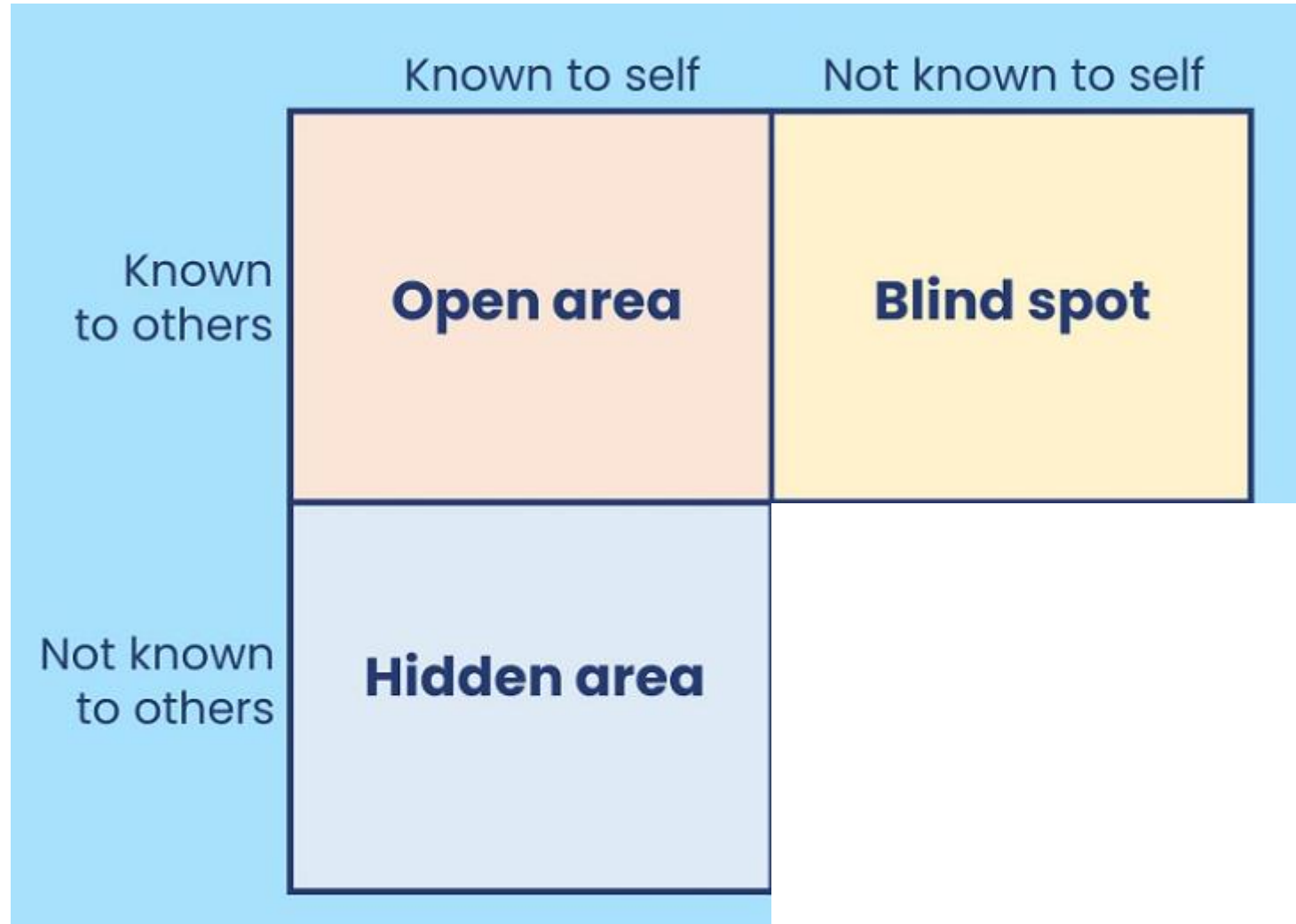

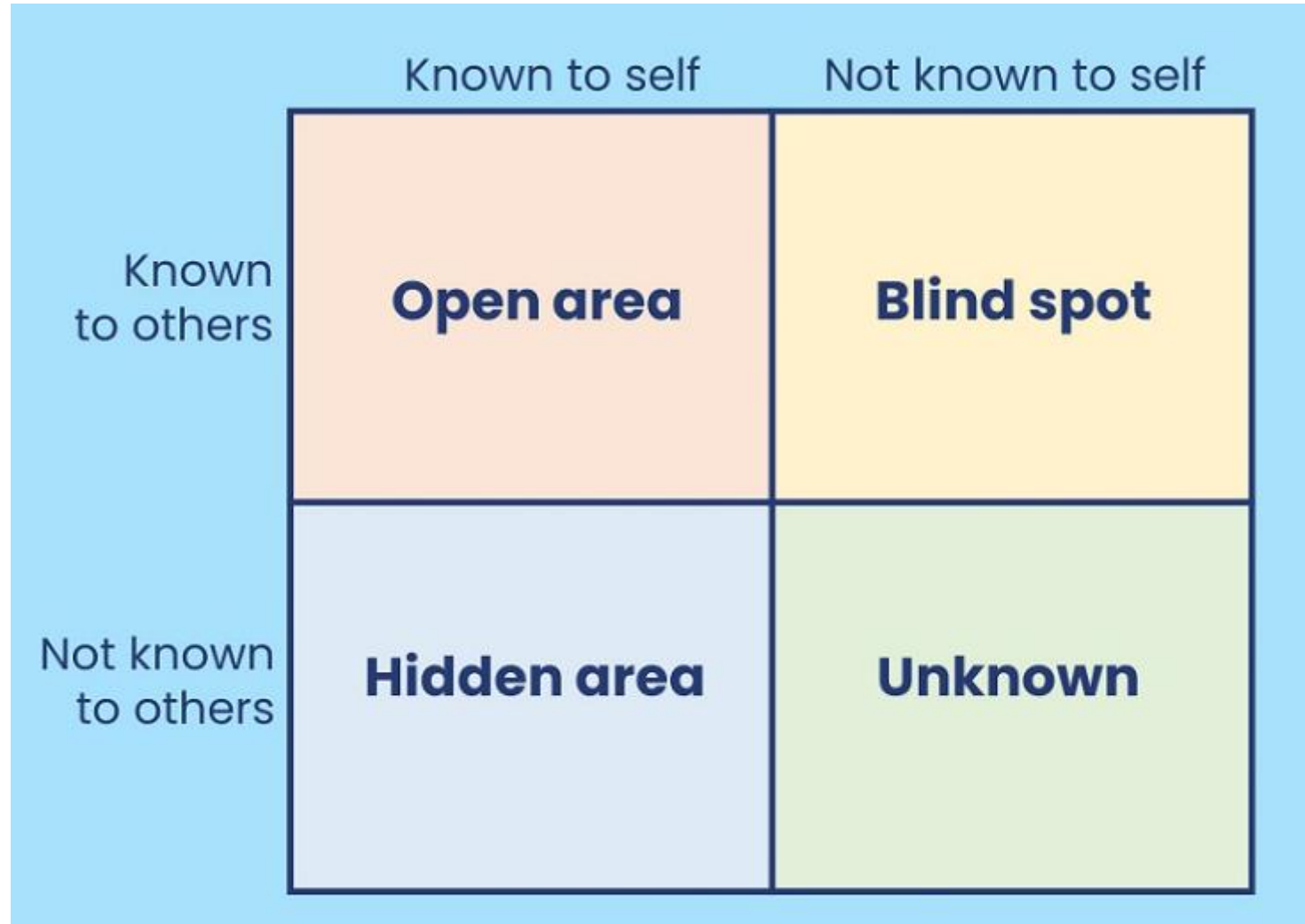

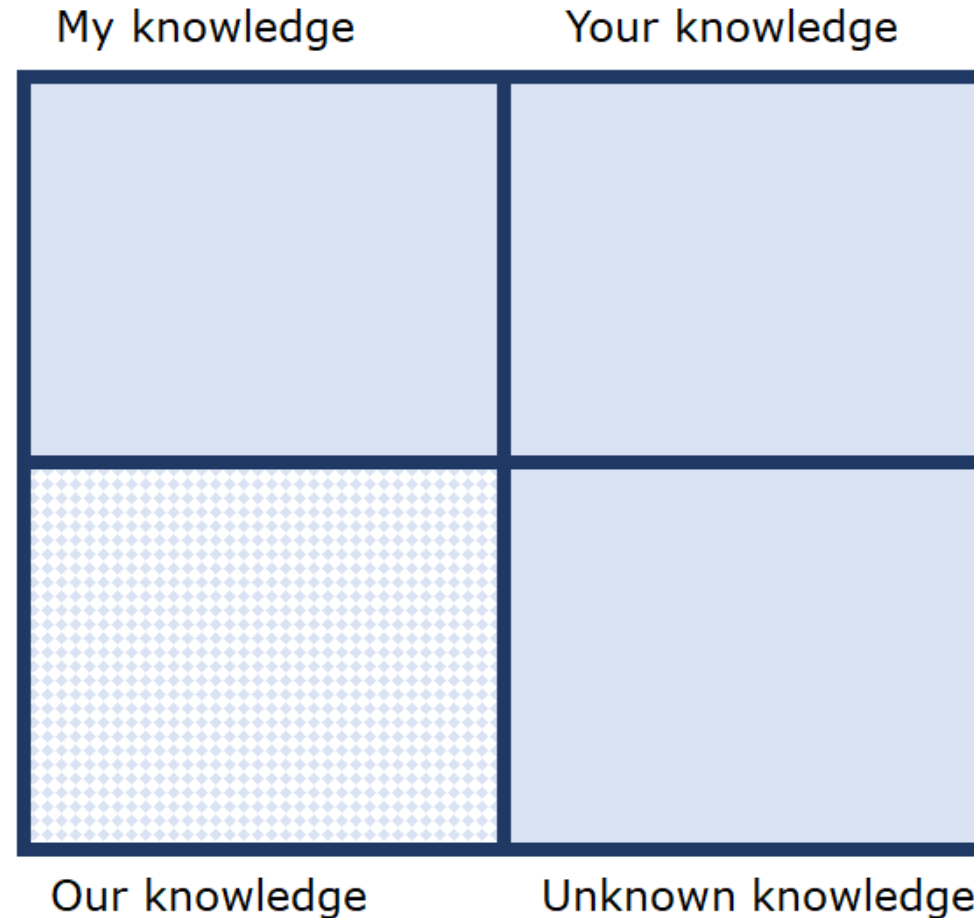

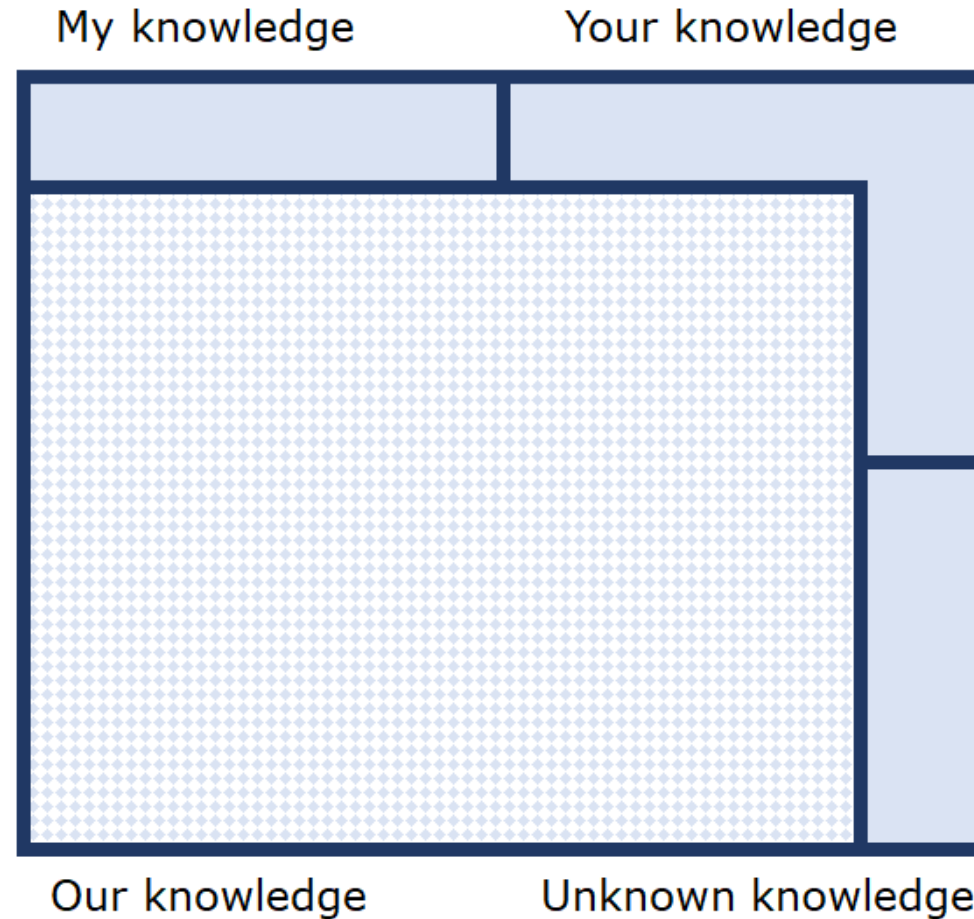


Our collective knowledge - start of the journey



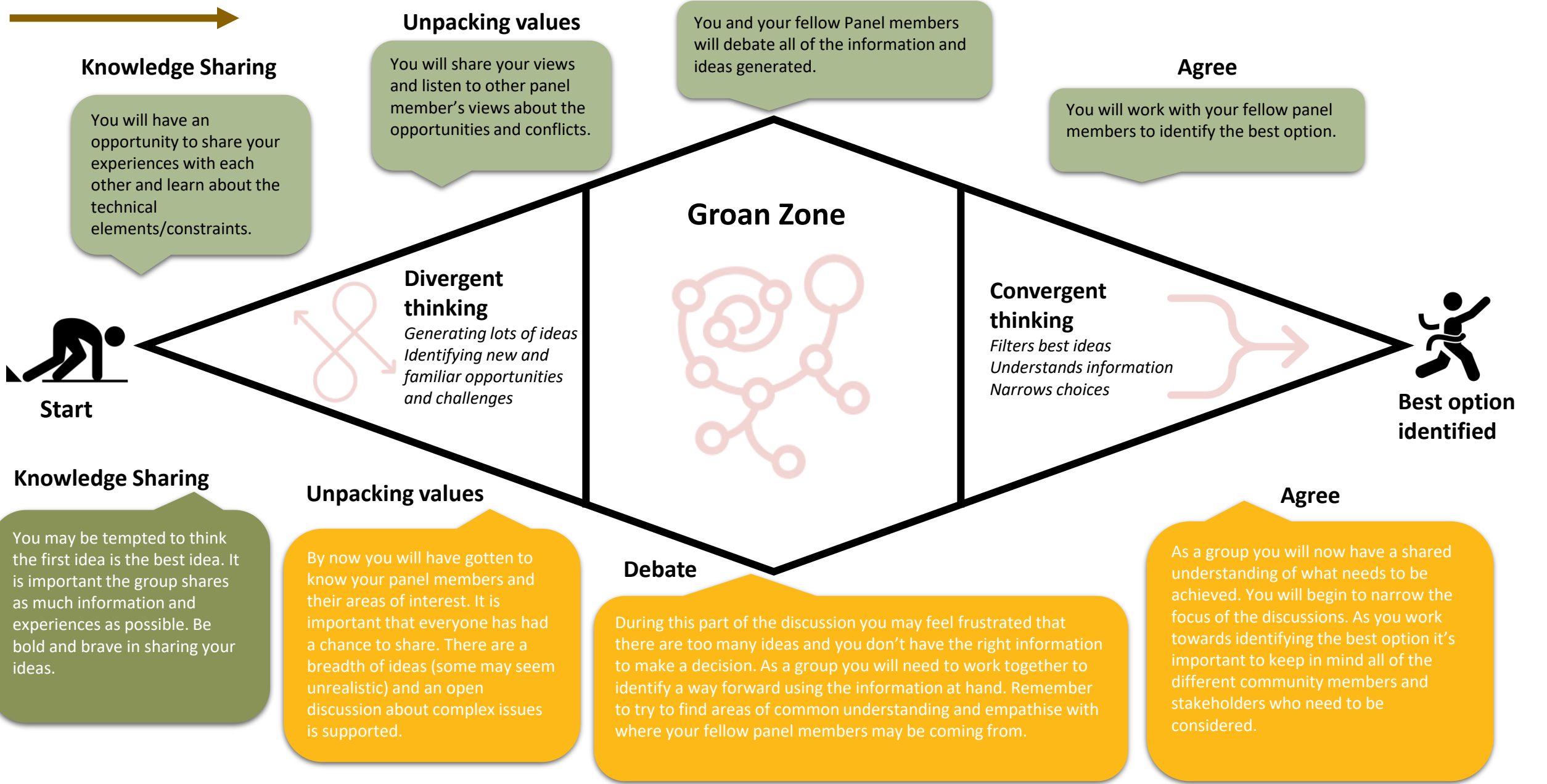

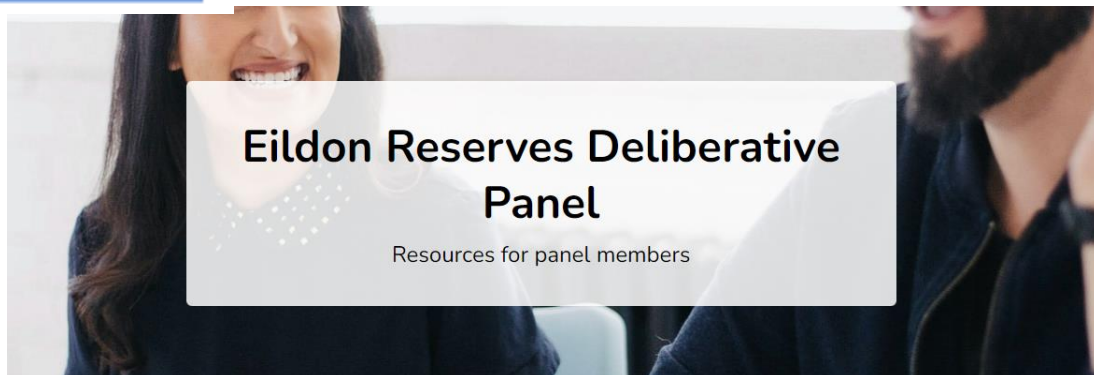
